Happy New (academic) Year from SACRE! I hope that the start to the new term has been going well If you are new to Bucks and/or new to leading RE/RS in Bucks, welcome and please do get in touch. This is a significant year as we will be starting the process of reviewing and renewing the agreed syllabus – doesn't time fly. We await the result of the Curriculum and Assessment Review, so depending on whether there is any change in the legislation, this could be the last 'Challenging RE' syllabus, first developed way back in 2006.

Professional Development

There are plenty of opportunities for CPD for RE teachers, either in the shape of training events, or online support and resources.

Primary Local Networks

Primary RE Teacher networks are held termly and this year there will be two separate meetings one North and one South. You can choose which to attend, depending on your school and/or where you live. These networks are designed to help you as teachers share what you are doing, raise questions, contribute ideas and express concerns/issues, so that you can support each other. Holocaust Memorial Day 27th Jan 2026 'Bridging Generations'

"This Holocaust Memorial Day (HMD) marks the 80th anniversary of the liberation of Auschwitz-Birkenau, the largest Nazi concentration camp complex, and the 30th anniversary of the genocide in Bosnia.

The theme for Holocaust Memorial Day (HMD) 2026, 'Bridging Generations', is a call-to-action. A reminder that the responsibility of remembrance doesn't end with the survivors - it lives on through their children, their grandchildren and through all of us. This theme encourages us all to engage actively with the past - to listen, to learn and to carry those lessons forward. By doing so, we build a bridge between memory and action, between history and hope for the future. There are many things we can all do to create a better future. We can speak up against Holocaust and genocide denial and distortion; we can challenge prejudice; we can encourage others to learn about the Holocaust and more recent genocides."

Recent national developments and statutory requirements:

The last few years have seen the development of a number of initiatives and documents within RE. It is important to remember that there has been no change in the law and so all of these developments and resources are non-statutory. The basis for planning your school RE curriculum remains the Locally Agreed Syllabus, for maintained schools, or the equivalent for Trust and other Faith or Academy schools. However, these documents are all designed to support in the development, planning and implementation of high quality religious education.

1. The Oak National Academy RE materials

These have now been released and are based on the principles of the Oak National Academy. **They are not a syllabus and cannot be used as a syllabus**, but as resources, adaptable power-points, worksheets and quizzes that you can use selectively **to support some aspects of the teaching of the Agreed**

Syllabus. They are all of the same Oak Academy structure and allow you to access subject knowledge. You can use them to help explore some of the enquiries within the Bucks Agreed Syllabus. You can access them here.

2. The DfE curriculum review

In March this year, the review panel published its <u>interim report</u>. RE was mentioned specifically:

"Subjects not on the national curriculum

RE and RSHE are subjects that schools are required by statute to provide, but which do not form part of the national curriculum. Despite the fact that RE is compulsory for all pupils up to the age of 18 (unless they are withdrawn), evidence suggests that a lack of national agreed content standards has led to national disparities in the quality of provision.

Similar sentiments have been raised in the Call for Evidence responses and in a Review roundtable with RE organisations. In contrast, the DfE provides statutory guidance for RSHE. It is currently reviewing the existing guidance in parallel with this Review and we will ensure that any implications of its findings are considered as we move into the next phase of work.

For these subjects, there is a balance to be struck between securing an entitlement to high quality content for all, and, particularly in the case of RE, the need for flexibility to be retained for different school types (i.e., schools with a religious designation and those without). We will consider these points through our analysis of each different subject before publishing our final report."

The final report is expected in November and we will take account of its findings as we **review the Bucks Agreed Syllabus for 2027-32** (see below)

The Bucks Agreed Syllabus 2027-32: Challenging RE V

We are now reviewing the Agreed Syllabus in readiness to produce the new one for September 2027. We have had feedback from teachers through last year and it was on the whole positive. Nationally it is well thought of. We plan to gain feedback from pupils through the members of the different network groups. We anticipate that the main developments will be in KS3, the use of concepts for progression and finalising support materials.

The Agreed Syllabus Conference (ASC) is setting up a writing panel of teachers, as we have done in previous years. We would like seven primary (Early Years, KS1 and KS2) and five secondary (two Grammar and three Upper School) teachers to work on this over the Spring and Summer terms. This is voluntary work and is excellent professional development. If you are interested, please contact Bill (bjvmoore@justbmoore.com) with a brief description of your experience. Please note that, especially in Primary, your experience of teaching RE is as important as your subject knowledge or expertise in Religious Studies.

Key elements of the syllabus will be:

- Developing the enquiry and worldviews approach
- Building on the use of concepts to enable planning and progression


From the current syllabus:

Learning Process



Conceptual Creativity

Creativity in RE.A structure to explore the link between experiences, feelings and how we express these. This enables us to help pupils to reflect on their own experiences and feelings, develop their ability to express their feelings and to empathise with others by building bridges between their own experience and others' through key questions and concepts.
